### Look for the Helpers

I was too old to have had much interest in watching Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood when I was a kid growing up on the Southside of Chicago. The show debuted in 1968, an inauspicious year to say the least. My mind, for the most part, was on baseball that year. I rushed home each day to try to beat my sister and girl cousins to the television so that I could watch the Cubs (I'm a Sox fan now). It would be wrong though to assume that I and other children my age and younger were unaware of things that were taking place around us.



The show began the year the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Presidential candidate and Senator Robert F. Kennedy were assassinated. Their deaths resulted in the creation of the U.S. National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence by Presidential Executive order. Vietnam War protests and heightened civil



unrest were commonplace. Riots and uprisings lit both passions and cities aflame. My father was a Chicago Police officer at the time of the protests at the Democratic Convention and all the violence that surrounded it. While I do not recall all that was happening in our home, he would likely have been working twelve-hour shifts like other police officers during the convention—including on my birthday.

As revealed in Won't You Be people who resist My Neighbor?, the recently released documentary that chronicles the life of the Rev. Fred Rogers, we learn of the ways he addressed

these issues and the spiritual, psychological, and emotional lives of children during the show. The show helped children deal with tragic events in the news.

Mr. Rogers said, "In times of community or world-wide crisis, it's easy to assume that young children don't know what's going on. But one thing's for sure, children are very sensitive to how their parents feel. They're keenly aware of the expressions on their parents' faces and the tone of their voices." 1

Rogers, reminiscing on his own childhood and upbringing, once wrote, "For me, as for all children, the world could have come to seem a scary place to live. But I felt secure with my parents, and they let me know that we were safely together whenever I showed concern about accounts of alarming events in the world. There was something else my mother did that I've always remembered: My mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping.' To this day, especially in times of disaster, I remember my mother's words, and I am always comforted by realizing that there are still so many helpers-



"Look for the helpers." It is so easy to get overwhelmed by the division that we see in our society-even in our own families. It is easy to feel besieged every time we turn on the news. We are less likely in those times to "look for the helpers." We are less likely to realize that there are "many caring people in this world."

In our baptismal covenant we commit to nurture one another and to surround those persons in our care with a community of love and forgiveness that they may grow in their trust of God, and be found faithful in their service to others. We are called to be the helpers, the compassionate caring people who resist evil, injustice, and oppression as we live both in and under the reign and rule of Christ Jesus.

Perhaps that same message needs to be heard afresh today, not just for our children but for us as well: "Look for the helpers." Be the helpersthe compassionate, caring people in the world that our children and the children of others can look to/for in difficult times.

### **Developing a Faith that Sticks**

Hello Parents! Welcome to our new monthly family letter. Thank you for taking the time to connect a bit more with our ministry.

You may have heard Pastor Brian or me share that research shows 40–50 percent of students from good youth groups and families will drift from God and the church after high school. As a youth pastor, I'm not satisfied with that. And I imagine you aren't either as a parent.

Imagine we lined up your child's class, shoulder to shoulder, and then numbered them off as ones and twos. Then we said to the ones, "Congratulations! As you head off to college, your faith will stick with you. You will stay connected to Jesus, to church life, and to spiritual practices like prayer and reading your Bible." But then we turned to the twos and said, "You guys ... eh, as you graduate, you're going to struggle. We know you're part of our church right now, but as you grow up, that won't be the case. Sorry about that."

It would break our hearts, of course.

Here at Gary, we are still continuing to reflect deeply on research from the Fuller Youth Institute about developing Sticky Faith in the lives of our students. We want your children to develop faith that sticks with them beyond youth group. We desire to help young people follow Jesus for a lifetime, and there are things we can do together to increase the likelihood that will happen.

Over the coming months, our team will focus on ways we can instill Sticky Faith in the lives of every one of our students. As a parent, you are essential to this process, and I want to invite you to be part of what we're doing. Each month, I will include a parent letter introducing one concept from Sticky Faith, along with a question or two about what it means for us here at Gary, with the hope that you will offer feedback. The key to this process is dialogue—I am eager to hear your thoughts and always available for deeper conversations if a particular concept really hits home for you. I'm excited to see what God will do through this process in the lives of our students and families! If you want to learn more about Sticky Faith on your own, you can visit stickyfaith.org.

Think about that first statistic again: 40–50 percent of students from good youth groups and families will drift from God and the church after high school. How does that number make you feel? If you were to guess, what would you say are some key reasons young people choose to stick with or walk away from faith?

### **Morning Has Broken:**

Daily Devotionals that Support Us in Prayer and in Life

Back in early spring I shared a devotional written by my friend Jennifer Grant with another friend, fellow Gary UMC member Cathy Mousseau. Wholehearted Living: Five-Minute Reflections for Modern Moms is one of several books I read as part of my morning ritual. Cathy and I talked about the power of devotionals and she invited me to present "Morning Has Broken: A Study of Devotions," a two-part discussion held at Gary Church in May. Participants contributed their own recommendations for the ritual of devotion and here are some highlights of those recommendations.

The Upper Room is a classic, available in our own Gary Commons, just left of the office door. For a mere \$2 donation you can pick up the pocket-size (or large print edition) booklet that includes recommended Bible readings, a message from contributors all around the world, a prayer, and a thought for the day. Many of us remember our parents using this guide in family prayer and I confessed to rolling my eyes as a teenager when my dad insisted we sit through the readings, only to carry this devotional in my purse later as an adult.

Bill and Mary Anne Phemister use The Upper Room to enrich their spiritual lives as well as their skills in speaking and reading French—they subscribe to La Chambre Haute, a six-month version of The Upper Room, but in French!

The United Methodist Church has a host of resources tied to the lectionary, available at http://umcdiscipleship.org/resources/resources-for-daily-lectionary-readings. Readings tied to our UMC three-year lectionary are available with devotionals and prayers.

Paula Wayland shared a digital resource that she can access on her phone: "Inward Outward," a resource from Church of the Saviour (sic) in Washington, D.C. You can subscribe to a daily quote (http://inwardoutward.org/category/daily-quote/) and a weekly gospel reading interpreted by contributors (http://inwardoutward.org/category/gospel-reflection/).

By Willoway Brook: Exploring the Landscape of Prayer is a book recommended by Elaine McCluskey. Described by the Chicago Sun-Times as "part memoir, part devotional, part field guide," this book by author Cindy Crosby provides parallels of prayer life against the backdrop of the prairie landscape of Illinois.

Many mentioned our own Lenten devotional, comprised of contributions from the Gary congregation, as a resource that sustains their prayer life. Our superlative music ministry, too, was mentioned as a type of devotional that uplifts our spiritual lives.

### Something You Should Know

### **Baptism**

Baptism is one of the sacraments of the Christian faith. In our United Methodist tradition, many of us were baptized, but we may not reflect on its meaning all that frequently.

Baptism is a multifaceted act of faith that is meaningful on several levels. This month let's take a closer look at baptism. Baptism is one of two sacraments recognized in the United Methodist Church, the other being holy communion. Baptism is a means of grace given by God in which we are initiated and incorporated into Christ's body, the church. It is not a one-time inoculation against sin that automatically gets us into heaven. It is the start of our spiritual journey in the church in which we are supported by, and in turn support, the congregation as we all grow and mature in our faith. It is the way we are incorporated into God's mighty and on-going acts of salvation for the world. It is the way we are cleansed of our sins and born anew by water and God's Spirit, and initiated into the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As our Baptismal covenant says, "This is God's gift, offered to us without price."

United Methodists believe that infant baptism is just as valid as the baptism of older believers because baptism is God's act in which we participate, and is not something we will ever completely understand, at any age. Jesus said, "Allow the children to come to me, and don't forbid them, because the kingdom of heaven belongs to people like these children" (Matthew 9:8). On the day of Pentecost, Peter offered the promise

of baptism without regard to age, saying it is for those present, their children, and those far away (Acts

2:38-41). Later in Acts, we read of Paul and Silas baptizing Lydia and her household, and later their jailer with his entire family (Acts 16), which would include children and probably servants.

During the baptismal act of worship, we renounce the spiritual forces of wickedness and evil and pledge to resist evil, injustice, and oppression. We confess Jesus as our Savior, trust in his grace, and promise to serve him and his church. The congregation promises to nurture the baptized person, and the rest of the members of the congregation, in Christian faith, surrounding them in love and forgiveness. We are then asked to remember our own baptisms, but how often do we do that? Perhaps we are not sure how we would go about doing that, especially if we were baptized as infants.

One way to remember our baptism is every morning, or evening, when we take a bath or shower we can remember the cleansing waters of baptism and recommit ourselves as followers of Christ. We can also remember our baptism when it rains and renews God's earth, as we were renewed in our baptism. And as we rise to start each day we can remember that in our baptism we were raised with Christ and share in his final victory over sin and death. In this way, we can renew our faith with each new day and dedicate it, and ourselves, anew to God as we remember our baptism, and who and whose we are.
