

Growing With Parenting

Our latest book recommendation and Sunday School class for parents is *Growing With*: Every Parent's Guide To Helping Teenagers and Young Adults Thrive in Their Faith, Family, and Future. Authors Kara Powell and Steven Argue are from Fuller Youth Institue, the group behind Sticky Faith which we have discussed so often. 

Increased online purchasing has exacerbated the desire by all to reduce disposal of this material. This resulted in a very big collection right after Christmas, which was taken to the Dart Container Corporation 24/7 public recycling center, 310 Evergreen Dr., North Aurora.

The hours for our bimonthly recycling will change as of the Sunday, February 23 collection to 8:45-9 a.m. and 10-11:15 a.m., still in the same location - the south driveway.

Answers can be found on your city's website or on a helpful list, created by SCARCE, of items that should not be placed in curbside bins. You can find this list at scarce.org/downloads/curbside-recycling/ or at garychurch.org.

Remember that #6 plastic (Styrofoam) is one of the things you cannot place in curbside recycling, but you can bring it to Gary Church on February 23 and the fourth Sunday of every other month from 8:45–9 a.m. and 10–11:15 a.m.



The meetings are full of laughter, fellowship, sharing, and caring, and everyone learns how to make a wide variety of items, all of which are suggested and voted on by members.

The Circle typically meets the second Wednesday of the month in Gamon Hall from 6:45 to 8:30 p.m. during the months of September to May, with one additional meeting and potluck lunch during the summer from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. They invite all women to the next crafting session on February 12 to make American flags from recycled corks and simple greeting cards—and encourage you to bring family, friends, and neighbors.



The People's Resource Center A Beacon of Help

Imagine for a moment that you are picked up and dropped down in another country, say Burma. You don't know the language or the customs. The climate, geography, and housing are completely different from what you know. It must be the most stressful and frightening experience you can think of. Yet, the Burmese people dropped here in DuPage County smile from ear to ear all the time. They might not understand anything you say, but the smile is ever-present.

The People's Resource Center (PRC) in Wheaton and Westmont has its doors open and the welcome mat out to very many immigrants. I believe over 100 languages are represented on our client roster. We offer food, clothing, literacy classes, mentoring, art classes, and computer classes. Once the language barrier is overcome, we help people study for citizenship.

I think about this situation very often and try to put myself in their shoes and I can't imagine what it must be like. The PRC does a wonderful job of helping the many populations over the hump and getting acclimated to their new lives as American citizens. I am so proud to play a tiny role in the process.

Singing: "It's What It Does for My Soul"

Gil Lehman, baritone, Chancel Choir

A three-year-old boy stood bravely in front of the tiny congregation at Harmon United Methodist Church to sing his very first solo. This was the beginning of Gil Lehman's lifelong dedication to music. After completing eight childhood summers of Bible school, he received a graduation certificate at a ceremony with pipe organ, piano, and lots of singing.

When Gil was a freshman in high school, his voice had not yet changed. Still a soprano with a lovely tone and high range, he was often invited to sing "Danny Boy." He chuckles remembering a time he wanted to attend a Harlem Globetrotters' game, but his music teacher and his father expected him to sing for the PTA meeting. He obeyed!

Gil stayed active in church music through high school, singing when they had enough people to make a choir. He admits that he was "kind of a troublemaker." He said something that hurt the feelings of his director, Eva Schwab. Gil's dad, a Mennonite, made him go to her house and apologize. Gil saw her again decades later. He broke down in tears, remembering how he had been unkind to her, but she forgave him freely.

Gil played trumpet in his school band and intended to become a professional trumpet player. He studied with the first chair trumpeter of the ABC Orchestra in Chicago. He graduated from high school in Dixon, IL, in 1944.

He took his trumpet along during his years of service in the Army Air Corps during WWII. He served as a cryptographic technician and played trumpet with the AAC Band in San Antonio, TX. After V-J Day, he reenlisted and went to Italy where he played trumpet with German prisoners of war.

Gil and his longtime friend Lewis Drummond were stationed at a base in Colorado. Lewis became active in the Billy Graham Crusade. A memorable conversation with Lewis helped Gil become "centered on the message of the Bible," in Gil's words. He finished his military service in 1946 and continued trumpet studies during his years at Coe College in Cedar Rapids, IA.

This is where a sweet and spunky girl entered the picture. Gil met Lola in a Sunday School class at St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Cedar Rapids. They both sang in the vesper choir at Coe College. Another cute choir member interrupted this love story, but Gil did come to his senses. He married Lola in 1950.

When Wheaton North High School opened in the early 1960s, Gil directed their choir and band. Having earned his BA in Music, his Master's in Education Administration, and a Certificate of Advanced Studies in Music Education, he became the Principal of Franklin Junior High.

He quickly realized he missed contact with students, and most of all he missed music. So he went back to teaching. A fifth-grade student once said to him, "Mr. Lehman, I know you teach music for fun, but what do you do for a living?"

The Lehmans came to Gary Church after being members at Aldersgate UMC for 25 years. Gil joined Gary's Chancel Choir in the mid-1960s and has been a valued member of the baritone section for over 50 years. "Music itself and the feelings that I have while singing" draw him to the choir. "It's what it does for my soul."

Gil has decided it is time for him to step back from choral singing, but to those who might consider joining a choir at Gary Church, he

says, "You will be accepted in the group and you will enjoy the experience of singing even if you do not have a lot of knowledge of music. You will find a worshipful experience and a very fine musical experience. Music is a powerful and wonderful thing. I have seen



Something You Should Know-New Habits

We have begun a new year, and we always look forward to new possibilities in the new year. The prophet Isaiah tell us, Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert – Isaiah 43:18 & 19, NRSV.

How many of you made New Year's resolutions? How many of you are still keeping them? Do you know why so many resolutions fail? It is because it takes a long time for an idea, or resolution, to become a habit. Research shows that it takes about sixty-six days on average to form a new habit, depending upon the difficulty of the task. One study showed drinking a glass of water after breakfast took about 20 days to become a habit, whereas eating a piece of fruit at lunch took twice as long. Taking on exercise is even harder, and one participant hadn't made it a habit after 84 days.¹ However, being part of a group helps us to remain committed. The group can provide encouragement and help hold us responsible to our commitment(s), if necessary.

Another factor that makes it hard to keep our resolutions is looking back at the past. Focusing on past hurts and disappointments can keep us stuck in the present and make it hard to change in the future. We have a sign in our kitchen that says, Don't look back. You are not going that way! Jesus said, No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God – Luke 9:62, NRSV.

This year, God invites us to commit to stop looking back at the past and embrace the possibilities God gives us for a new and different future. I challenge everyone to take on the spiritual disciplines of reading the Bible first thing in the morning, maybe with a cup of coffee or tea, and then spending a few minutes in prayer and meditation before breakfast. It can be an uplifting way to start the day.

I also urge us to encourage each other and build each other up. Let us be mindful of what our neighbors are experiencing and help them through it, if we can. That should be what the Body of Christ is about, uplifting each other. Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ – Galatians 6:2. Remember, God can help us to do new things, if we allow it, and it is never too late to start.
