Confirmed into a Great Cloud

Being a United Methodist pastor's child in rural America gave me some interesting and particular insights into the Church. They may not be original or unique, but at least they are a different view than most people experience.

The congregations in which my siblings and I lived and grew in our faith and the United Methodist Church into which we all were confirmed always bring Hebrews 12:1-3 to mind:

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider him who endured such opposition from sinners, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart.

When I confirmed my belief that Jesus Christ was my Lord and Savior, God in turn confirmed me into a Great Cloud! It was a cloud that included six pastoral charges representing eleven congregations (my Dad was often a pastor with a circuit of congregations). Yet, when I think of those congregations, buildings and spaces rarely flash before my eyes . . . it is faces. Ms. Cheryl who taught me to love and memorize scripture. Ms. Ruby and Ms. Myrna who helped me learn to sing the hymns and songs of God and to be unashamed in praising God aloud, even if others look askance at you. Ms. Janie and Mr. Larry who taught me how to love each other as a Christian couple and work in places where your job will challenge you, but how you can be a faithful and powerful witness in that hard context. Or Ms. Ann, who taught me education and faith are not something which oppose one another.

Education can deepen and enliven your faith and help you to spread it in ways you could not have imagined before. I could fill up pages mentioning names that flash before my eyes. However, all these people, from different places and congregations were the Church or Great Cloud of Witnesses in which I was confirmed. They were not perfect or always right.

Yet, by their witness and intentional interaction in my life, they helped me throw off things which hindered me from following Christ and sins that entangled me. I would not be a person who seeks to be a disciple of Christ without them.



One of my favorite pictures of Gary Church is this one from April 2018 when we confirmed 21 students. It is not because I am in it (in fact, you can barely see Pastor Chris and me behind all those growing Confirmands).

The picture is my favorite because it visually shows us what Confirmation is all about: young people putting their faith into the grace, sacrifice, and resurrection of Jesus Christ as God confirms them into a Great Cloud of Witnesses. Faith in Christ cannot happen alone; it requires a community to encourage, fortify, challenge, and grow this faith.

Our students need Gary Church. Yes, Gary Church provides for them an amazing worship space, beautiful music, and a place of safety. However, what they need most is not a building space . . . they need you and your ongoing experience of salvation found only in Christ Jesus. It is true we may only be one part of a greater cloud of witnesses they will experience in their life. But you will play a pivotal and foundational role in their faith. I know this to be true—for I am living proof. I encourage you to intentionally become part of our students' lives at Gary Church through the Pray For Me Campaign, Gary Kids, Gary Youth, or our College Ministry. What a great opportunity we have here at Gary Church to help students fall in love and follow Christ as Savior . . . and in so doing those students help the rest of us as well. Students encourage and challenge our faith, exciting us to more faithfully follow Christ as Lord and Savior. They will help us not grow weary or lose heart in our Savior or his salvation in this world!

Simple Family Rituals That Build Faith

Dear Parents,

Last month, we talked about the importance of celebrating big moments in our children's lives. But beyond recognizing milestones, simple rituals can also have big significance in the life of a teen.

The Sticky Faith research shows that the little ways a family engages faith together have major impact. For example:

- You could share a consistent meal together. If not daily, perhaps there's one dinner a week that can be set aside as a family time.
- During any meals that you are together, ask questions.
 Simply asking about daily activities strengthens communication and relationships for other times when the conversation might plunge even deeper.
- Start conversations in the car. Many families have shared that the car offers the single best place for them to talk about faith together.
- Talk about how faith is connected to a current event. You might say, "Have you heard about X?" Your kid might say yes or no, depending on the event. Ask an open-ended question or two such as, "What do you think about that?" or "I wonder what the people in that community are feeling..." Then, if appropriate, you might share your own reflections. For example, "It's just interesting to me as a Christian ..." or "It makes me wonder...." It's not the time for a sermon, but it could start great dialogue about faith and life.
- Create a Sunday tradition in addition to worshiping at church. Maybe you get ice cream on Sunday nights, eat at a certain restaurant for lunch, or watch a movie or TV show together.
- One family I know has a tradition called "Wow, Pow, Holy Cow." Each person shares something good (a wow), something bad (a pow), and something that pointed you to God (a "holy cow" experience).

Small traditions like this can create a regular ritual in which your family can engage faith together. It doesn't have to happen every single day, and some weeks are just crazy, but often these rituals create the space for conversation to happen more often than it would otherwise.

On April 12 and 13, Gary's 4th & 5th Grade Fellowship students participated in SuperStart, a weekend of energetic worship, faith-enriching lessons, an overnight at Wheatland-Salem Church, and a visit to Naperville's Ultimate Ninja Gym. The theme this year was "Conquering Gargantor - Overcoming Obstacles to Sharing Your Story." We all have a story to share our own individual story that fits inside the greater story of God's love for all people. But there are gargantuan obstacles preteens face that keep them from sharing their story. Throughout our weekend together, the teachings centered around helping our students to conquer three of the most common obstacles: "I don't have a story to share," "I'm afraid to share my story," and "Why should I share my story?" We heard from real life American Ninja Warrior, Emily Durham, who talked about overcoming obstacles and reminded students that God will always be with them, helping them to share those stories!


