This was our 11th trip in nine consecutive years to Lafayette, IN. The team included Kevin Carlson, Joe and Lois Davisson, Bob and Fern Evelhoch, George Masek, Ralph and Kathy Gehrig, Jamie Geiger, Ken Hoppe, Nickie Kelly, Elaine McCluskey, David and Cindy Plate, Allen Reed, David Rush, and Gerry Schmidt.

The team spent the first part of the week working on three homes. The main priority was the interior remodel of an existing house for the new home owner, Shawn Rector. Shawn worked side by side with us during the week, which was such a blessing. We cleaned all the walls, patched a lot of drywall, painted the walls and ceilings, painted the front porch, installed a new exterior door, installed new kitchen cabinets, counter top and sink, and new light fixtures. In addition to working on Shawn's home, part of the team worked Monday and Tuesday at a second home removing old carpet and painting walls, doors, and trim. The third project was at a new construction site where we were doing landscaping, moving dirt, removing rocks, and preparing the soil for seeding the new lawn.

Through the generous contributions from Gary Church members our team had the opportunity to present Doug Taylor, Executive Director of Habitat for Humanity of Lafayette, a check from Gary Church for \$1,000.



Many denominations and churches celebrate or mark what is known as "Reformation Day" on October 31 or the Sunday prior to October 31. "Reformation Day is a day set aside to recognize, remember, and celebrate the Protestant Reformation. In some countries, it is observed as an official holiday. It remembers Martin Luther and the central role he played in the reform movement that split the western church of Rome." This year, commemorations of the Protestant Reformation have reached new heights as we mark the 500th year.

In our adult education classes, led by Dr. Andy Tooley during the month of October, and in our worship services on October 29, we too recognized the 500th year. "United Methodists celebrate Reformation Day with a sense of moving toward unity and community." "Though we are not descendants of Luther, both John and Charles Wesley were priests in the Church of England, so our roots are deep in the Anglican tradition." In our sanctuary windows, images of Martin Luther and John Wesley are placed across from each other, but each looks toward the chancel and the cross of Christ. The stained-glass windows also communicate that we are a people who are both into the Word and into the world.

Our roots do indeed go deep! The late Bishop Reuben P. Job is often seen as one who helped to shape how United Methodists view the teachings of John Wesley. In his book *A Wesleyan Spiritual Reader*, Bishop Job wrote, "There was a time when Methodists could be recognized very easily. To refer to the history of the Methodist movement in Great Britain and the United States is to discover that Methodists were never easy to hide! Like their father in the faith, Methodists were interested in such simple things as saving faith, the practical ways to keep that faith alive, and a living out of that faith in every aspect of daily life, both private and public."

Job goes on to describe the committed and contagious nature of the faith of our forebears as bringing "respect as well as derision...Many wanted what Methodists appeared to have. Among these gifts were a certain knowledge of their own salvation, an at-homeness in this world and confidence in the next, a living companionship with a living Christ, and access to the power of God that could and did transform the most broken and hopeless persons into productive, joyful, and faithful disciples."⁵

Our guiding theme for the year—"Rooted in Trust"—draws upon this rich legacy, but in a way that is always looking forward to where God is leading us as disciples and as a faith community.

It is that living relationship nurtured from the source that is God's power that will make a difference in our lives and in our world. In this way, we are a part of the continuing movement of the work of God in the lives of God's people. Let us be rooted in trust in the God who is able through his mighty power at work within us, to accomplish infinitely more than we might ask or think. Glory to him in the church and in Christ Jesus through all generations forever and ever! Amen.





Campaign Milestones

- Church families' giving through September has culminated in contributions equal to 78% of the GNBT goal of \$1.8 Million.
- 241 Families have participated and many have already completed their pledges.
- We have received a total of \$1,251,100 in pledged gifts and \$156,982 of non-pledged gifts.
- Total support to the Trustees has reached \$690,288 through September.
- The mortgage was paid off in 2016 and no additional debt reduction is required.

It is a pleasure to present another positive God's Next Big Thing Campaign to-date report! Once again, your gifts and pledges have continued to move us closer to our \$1.8M, five-year campaign giving goal. The graphics and summary show to date our giving progress and distributions to initiatives.

Our church staff are excellent stewards, so when this occurs it has true implications for programs. Trustees Corner

In my last article, I provided information on repairs to the steam heating system for the Sanctuary, the Chapel and Gamon Hall. September and October were busy as we completed all the repairs to the system. Volunteers from the church changed out 39 radiator steam traps located in the Chapel, Gamon Hall, and the Sanctuary. The volunteers also removed the radiator covers in the Sanctuary and Chapel so our HVAC mechanical contractor, Power Mechanical, could make repairs to the radiators. The volunteers then reinstalled the radiator covers.

Power Mechanical also installed the new boiler feed water tank, repaired the heating control system in the Sanctuary and Gamon Hall, installed a new heating control system in the Chapel, replaced about 50 feet of leaking steam return piping, and made several modifications to improve the efficiency of the system. We should be good to go for another heating season.

A big thank you to Eric Ostensen, Keith Nystrom, Jesse Exner, Bob Barnes, Kevin Carlson, and Steve Wernicke for helping with the steam repairs.

Repairs to the asphalt alleyway along the south side of the church were completed in October making the road much smoother. In October, work also started on another big project—the masonry and roof repairs to the Tower and masonry tracery repairs to the exterior of the Sanctuary stained-glass Rose Window. Plans are to complete this work before the cold weather arrives.

It was in 1969 that Bill Davisson and other members of Gary responded to the invitation to join God at work serving seven needy families with children in District 200.

Now, 48 years later, in a combined effort with eight other churches, all the schools of Wheaton/Warrenville District 200, the Milton Township office, World Relief, area businesses and many individuals, we expect to join God at work in serving the needs of over 1000 families with children in District 200!

As the needs have grown over the years, we have also grown in how we serve these needs. Our mission is to provide a Christian connection with these needy families by helping to clothe and feed them.

There are a number of ways for you to join with God in serving:

Donate food boxes (or money for food purchase). Deliver to church December 4–7.

- Sign up to donate food box(s) at the display in the Commons or write a check to pay for a food box.
- Pick up a food shopping list and the number of boxes indicated on the list.

Donate packages of unpeeled carrots (whole) and/or apples for the food boxes Dec 5–8.

Donate new coats, children's pajamas, socks, diapers, gloves, mittens, hats, and scarves.

- Take ornaments from the tree in the Commons.
- Place unwrapped items in bags (include the ornaments) and return them to the Commons by December 4.

Donate new toys.

- Take an ornament from the tree and purchase appropriate toys for the stated ages and genders. Teen gifts are a special need.
- Place unwrapped items in box by tree (include ornament) in the Commons by December 4.

Donate gently used clothing, all ages and sizes, December 4–7.

Donate gently used household items—linens, Christmas decorations, kitchenware, small appliances, etc., by December 7.


"WHISK" SENIORS A HAPPY HOLIDAY

Midwest Shelter for Homeless Veterans



Bob married his current wife Judy and moved to Plainfield three years ago. But he and Judy make the drive to Winfield every other week for worship, and Bob still takes a turn each month mowing the lawn. Bob is someone who takes his church membership seriously, and has been a faithful contributor of his time, talent, and treasure to Winfield Church for many years.


